elfless Energy burning Relationship filled Very outside your comfort zone Exercise in Living Like Jesus




This summer, CUMC Student Ministry spent a lot of time serving. It got me thinking about what serving is really about. Here's what I learned SERVE is:

Serving is taking time from students that they could be sleeping, hanging out with their friends, relaxing, playing on their phone and instead doing something for someone else.

Rebuilding a home, or even picking corn in the heat of the day burns a lot of energy when we give it our full effort. This summer 26 students used their energy to rebuild a home, and collect many pounds of fresh produce for our neighbors.







I could write books about the relationships that have been built serving together this summer, but I'll tell you just about one. Ms. Belinda was the owner of the home we rebuilt in North Carolina this summer. She lived in the home with her two daughters - one of whom was 8 months pregnant. They had only been able to live in a quarter of the home that wasn't destroyed by Hurricane Florence in 2018. The first 2 days we worked on their house without much interaction, but on day three, as we finished up, I got to show Ms. Belinda the progress we had made in the bathroom. She was overcome with tears upon the sight of her almost completed bathroom. She thanked God for sending us there to meet her needs. That night the graduating seniors went to the store and bought some extra finishing touches for in the bathroom (towel rods, TP holder, etc) and got baby clothes for the soon-to-be born little boy. When we were all finished on the final day we gave them not only the gift of their home back, but the baby gifts. Over a few short days students grew together as better friends, we all grew closer to God - whom we saw guiding us every day - as we made another friend in Ms. Belinda and her family.



Typically, every time we have served this summer, at least everyone has done something outside of their comfort zone. It might be simple like learning how to pick a good watermelon or more complicated like how to use a power tool or install new lights or door handles in a home.

SAFE HARBOUR BABYSITTING

The CUMC Serve ministry partners with various community agencies to build bridges and share the love of Jesus Christ. Safe Harbour, which has been providing secure housing for homeless and nearly homeless children and adults for more than three decades, is one of these community agencies. Several years ago, CUMC partnered with Safe Harbour by providing a Homework Club that assisted school-aged children with reading, math and homework. After a few successful years of working with children in this capacity, CUMC found that there was little need for this ministry at Safe Harbour due to the lack of schoolaged kids living at Safe Harbour. Many families stay only briefly at Safe Harbour and the population is always changing. For that reason, the Homework club stopped at Safe Harbour and focused on their program at Hope Station. However, starting this September, CUMC has found a new way to partner with

Safe Harbour. CUMC volunteers will be entertaining kids for 1 hour on some Tuesday and Thursday evenings while their parents attend mandatory life skills and parenting classes at Safe Harbour. Volunteers will provide snacks, play games and assist with homework if needed. This not only allows for Safe Harbour parents to attend their classes without distraction or worry of finding a sitter, but also allows for CUMC volunteers to make a difference in the lives of these families. Volunteers showing up to help, demonstrates to parents that community support is there for them. Volunteers showing a little extra love and attention to these children can make a huge difference. You might be surprised at how much of a difference it can make in the volunteers' life as well!
