#### LENT: A SEASON FOR GREENING OF YOUR SOUL

The Christian Church has a seasonal calendar all of its own. The Christian seasons have nothing to do with the weather and have everything to do with experiencing the story of Jesus more fully, knowing Jesus more deeply, and recalibrating our life to live more and more like Jesus.

Lent is a season of 40 days (excluding Sundays), leading up to Easter. This season traditionally was a time for converts to prepare for baptism on Easter and for all Christians to renew their faith and experience the joy, power, and mystery of the resurrection on Easter. Easter will be on April 4 this year, and the season of lent begins on Wednesday February 17.

The season of "Lent" comes from the English word meaning "spring" and is not just a reference

to the emerging green buds of the crocuses, but to the 'greening' of the soul. This year during Lent will also mark a year of living through a pandemic. As we look forward to emerging this year from this collective experience, I think many of us are feeling the need for greening of our souls. ## What's Coming Up with GROW Adults?

As we get closer to Easter I have been putting more thoughts into what comes after. Not just what comes after Jesus' resurrection from the grave, but what comes after the Lenten classes that haven't even started as I'm writing this. Planning ministries three to six months out is never a particularly easy task; and as I'm sure you all know, the past year has only made it more difficult. Despite that, we must continue to look to the future and make what plans we can. Here are a couple of things that are in the works for the coming months.

Disciples: Invitation to Psalms. I have heard from several people that they want to continue using the Disciple Bible Study curriculum, and Vicki Morley has agreed to take the lead on the next session of these classes. Invitations to Psalms is a ten-week course that will begin soon after Easter.

Book study on leadership. One of my goals for the coming months is to lead a class on the topic of small groups and leadership. I'm in the process of selecting a book and hope to announce the study later in March.

In 2020 we learned all heroes don't wear capes but may wear scrubs, deliver mail, stack shelves at stores, and care for our elders. In appreciation and encouragement for heroes in Carlisle caring for those sickest with Covid, our Christmas Eve offering this year was designated for our health care workers. UPMC Carlisle was overjoyed when we proposed this idea and provided ideas that would be a blessing to staff on the front lines and those behind the scenes making our hospital run smoothly. They asked for snacks

for their 678 staff to grab quickly during their shifts, and shared that 12 of their 41 departments had wishes for Keurig machines. Throughout the Christmas season donations poured in. In total \$6800 was collected, allowing us to expand beyond the wishes of UPMC Carlisle. We reached out to the UMC Chaplain serving at Cumberland Crossings and a CUMC member working at Chapel Pointe care communities. Each came up with unique ways that would be a blessing to their staff to

#### **Our Future Neighbors**

In January The Sentinel newspaper announced the rezoning of the remaining 19.2 acres of the Smith Farm adjacent to our church property. The property was approved for a mix of institutional, commercial and residential uses according to South Middleton township. Part of the development is for 300 apartments that includes housing for senior living and some for residents in need.

Infrastructure development could begin as early as spring 2021 according to Integrated Development Partners who is coordinating the project. Carlisle UMC is not directly involved in any of the development plans but is excited as our new neighbors become known to find ways to work together.



#### SCHOLARSHIP FOR STUDENTS

Each spring CUMC is able to support students (and their families) with funds for higher education. We are hopeful we will be able to do that this fall if the market stays stable.

## **CUMC Nursery.**



The beginning of 2020 was exciting for all of us at CUMC, the Spring Garden Campus would be completed soon and our numbers in the nursery were increasing. In 2019 the nursery helped care for 13 families and in 2020 we had 26 families. When we had to close down, we had to adapt and change like the rest of the world by finding new ways to connect with our families. We started sending out weekly lesson plans and mailing our children the weekly coloring pages.

When we were able to open our brand-new nursery, we enjoyed seeing old and new faces! This fall, when we closed again, we wanted to find new ways to connect with our families. We continued sending out weekly e-mails and letters to our nursery children, but we wanted to do more. We wanted to feel more connected to our families and we wanted them to feel connected to CUMC. We started sending weekly videos on Sundays with our childcare workers reading the Bible story of the week. This was a way our families could continue to include their children in worship with shorter videos and a coloring page. Some of our childcare workers also assisted in checking in with our families which gave us more opportunities to connect. During this time, we have been able to connect with new families who joined the nursery before we closed down and reconnect with the families who did not feel comfortable attending church during this pandemic.
