Working cooperatively with the Transition Team, the Focus Groups made the critically important decisions that led to the formation of our Leadership Council, the church staff, a multitude of policies, identification of our many ministries and programs and our unique identity as a new church.

This fall as we approached groundbreaking and the initial work at the construction site, the Leadership Council saw the opportunity to revisit and examine whether what we are presently doing best meets our mission, vision and dreams for our new church space. 

HAITI TRIP 2019

(Unless noted, quotes throughout are from the 2019 Haiti Team)

Serving in Haiti exposes you to amazing hope amid seemingly insurmountable poverty and deep spiritual questions in the presence of a powerful God. Returning home is always difficult. Certainly, you are happy to be home, but "strangely you are homesick for the place you just left." (Lena Wood - "CHANGED" Mission Trip Devotions and Journal) You start "feeling the post-trip blues" "wondering what your purpose is in this life and missing your new friends. It's a funny thing ...you spend focused, concentrated time caring for your team mates and then they're gone."

In a recent video, Amy Valdez Barker, executive director for Global Mission Connections, talks about the importance of relationship building. Amy says that mission and ministry are at the heart of relationship building. It's about connecting people and getting to know one another, and it's about recognizing that God is already at work in the people where we are serving. "That's an interesting perspective on mission trips... engaging with our global Christian friends as an honor and privilege to share time with one another."

As we transitioned from the Haiti Response Plan, our goal was to be intentional about returning to the same community. Since January 2018 we have served in Mellier three times; we can be truly focused on building a long-standing relationship. This has also allowed us to follow-up with beneficiaries of the Micro-Credit Bank and explore the possibility of a deeper commitment to

the Mellier school and church. Through sharing our time and resources we helped with paying teacher salaries and repairing school buildings. Our visits with beneficiaries of the Micro-Credit Bank were short. We learned that the small loans they received resulted in positive changes to their businesses and lives. Hearing their stories and witnessing their praises to God were affirmation that sharing our resources is pleasing to God.

"It takes a while to readjust to being back home... it's more than just the tempo of life." All of us had been to Haiti before. We expected the "post trip blues". This time something was different... We want to share the story... "especially now that we are returning with updates on ongoing projects." Please join us to hear "the rest of the story" on Sunday, Mar. 3 at 9:45 or 11am.

POETs are marathoners, seemingly lonely runners, fully committed to laying prayers for peace upon God's altar.

Every Sunday after the sanctuary services, the Postlude Prayer Teams join a pastor at the altar rail to offer intercessory or praise prayer for anyone who seeks it. These are precious, moving, and intimate moments where the Holy Spirit surrounds the petitioners, and peace emerges.

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven:

a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.


I can think of few people who have lived these verses out in the last 20 or so years more than the people of the country of Sierra Leone in West Africa. These are people I have come to know and to love through the Susquehanna Conference's Sierra Leone Initiative and my two relationship building trips there in 2010 and 2016; once representing Allison UMC and once with Brad Weiser and Christina Benson representing Carlisle UMC. On my first trip I saw a country slowly recovering from a brutal civil war. The Sierra Leone Initiative was started, Conference wide, to help the UM Churches recover from the devastation of that war through the payment of pastoral salaries.

Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8

Over time, some local churches, including ours, agreed to be partnered with specific churches in Sierra Leone to build more direct relationships and to support the church in other ways. When our small 2016 CUMC Serve team arrived the country was just beginning to recover from the ravages of the Ebola epidemic. While the congregation of our partner church, First Makeni UMC lost only a few to the terrible disease, their city was a center of Ebola treatment, and no one was untouched by the traumatic events of the fearsome epidemic. Many said the time of Ebola was

scarier for them than the time of war had been. If you've ever watched the film *Blood Diamonds* which is about the war, you, like me, will find it hard to believe that anything could have been scarier or more traumatic for people than that war had been.

Over the years CUMC has been blessed to provide many kinds of assistance to our brothers and sisters in Sierra Leone. We've contributed monthly to a pot of money, once hand delivered throughout the country, to help support local pastors and their families. At First Makeni, CUMC helped fund necessary renovations to the church building including the construction of modern toilets to replace an unsafe and unsanitary pit latrine. We've supported school children by providing culturally appropriate reading books to classrooms that have no books at all. We've funded scholarships to preschool, elementary, secondary, and college-aged children so they could attend UM schools. We've supported a women's that dyes fabric to make money for the church and to support their families. Ladies in our congregation have sewn hundreds of dresses which have been sent/ taken over along with shirts and shorts for the boys. For many children these were their first new clothes. Women have also sewn



It seems now that the season for this relationship has changed. This has happened for a variety of reasons. The scope of our mission efforts has increased here in the U.S. as we undertake trips to help families recover from natural disasters of immense proportions and work to address issues of poverty, hunger, and homelessness right here in our community. Our communication with the Sierra Leone Initiative on this side of the ocean has been challenging, which presents issues when communication with the people in Sierra Leone is costly and difficult. Furthermore, travel to Sierra Leone is expensive and difficult, making it difficult for us to maintain relationships in the way we should and to be good stewards of resources sent almost 4,500 miles away.
